
A State of Need

- > 56% of Kentucky's jobs are projected to require some college training in 2020.
- ➤ Workers with a high school diploma or GED® are twice as likely to be unemployed as those with a Bachelor's degree.
- ➤ Incomes for those with just some college but no degree average 15% higher in KY than for those with a high school diploma or GED®.


Job Growth in Kentucky by Education Level

The Need is Growing


American employers in 2025 will need about 23 million more degree and certificate holders than our nation's colleges and universities will have produced.


Kentucky's Adult Education System: Decades of Progress

Population, 18-64, without a High School Credential





Percent of Population, 18 - 64, without a High School Credential 2000





Percent of Population, 18 - 64, without a High School Credential 2010





KYAE Enrollment 2008-2012






GED® Graduates Enrolling in a Kentucky College or University within Two Academic Years


The Leaky Pipeline

Unemployment by Education Level, 2010




Small Scale, Big Impact: Project Graduate


Educational Attainment of Adults Ages 25 to 64
