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Poetry and Mathemalchemy

I am an English Major with a creative writing track. I have experience authoring stories, long and short, poetry, scripts, and more. A little background about why I chose my major; I have tried many majors, but none ever grasped me like English. I always had a love for reading and writing as a young girl, it was a way and still is, to express myself that I never could physically. Now, with math, I am the opposite. It was never a subject that I fancied still to this day. That is why for this project I want to incorporate English into Mathemalchemy in a way that cannot only help me but others in better understanding the chaotic "greatness" that is Mathemalchemy.
